

MarinTrust Improver Programme: 6-month update

Some training in SS3 (statistical stock assessment methodology) was provided by FAO in 2024, but was not entirely satisfactory (not adapted to the data available for this fishery). 		As noted in the previous report, the reference points used by CECAF for these stocks do not include limit reference points which are suitable to be applied as intended by the MarinTrust standard version 3. We have conducted a review of the approach to LRPs in all the MarinTrust approved whole fish fisheries (evidence 5), to evaluate different possible approaches to LRPs for these types of stocks. This will be used as the basis for defining additional reference points.			
		Just to repeat here the comment made in the previous annual report to MarinTrust: It would be useful to have a discussion with MarinTrust about the extent to which the regulations across other jurisdictions need to be integrated with the regulations in Mauritania, in order for each stock to meet clause A3.1 in the standard, given the relative level of catch of each species in Mauritania vs other jurisdictions.
