#### iii) Growth in Salmon Producer

**representation** – NAPA now has <u>eight</u> <u>partners</u> from the global salmon producing sector – Mowi, SalMar, Leroy, Grieg Seafood, Cermaq, Salmon Group, Aquascot, Scottish Sea Farms. This sector is predominantly based in Norway and a major end user of blue whiting in the form of fishmeal. With these members on board, NAPA now holds 80 percent of the total Norwegian salmon production.

**iv) Evidence gathering and analysis –** NAPA has commenced three projects to gather economic evidence to enhance its advocacy work:




the 11/24 NEAFC annual meeting that Russia maintained its objection to the amendment and that, as a result, it remains not in effect for any party. As such, there is currently no formal, disputes resolution process at NEAFC. There is also no formal process at the Coastal States.		
In this regard, a key meeting was the 2/25 Future Direction of NEAFC (FDN) meeting, where the NAPA Technical Lead joined with other observers (Pew, MSC, Accountability.Fish, Blue) to petition for a new Dispute Resolution Process to be considered. Prior to this, discussions were held with the observer group in 12/24 to confirm attendance and potential options for a submission to the meeting's Chair (UK Coastal States Head of Delegation).		
NAPA Technical Lead attended (remotely) the available Coastal States pelagic plenary sessions. Most Coastal States negotiations do not have plenary sessions planned. NAPA Technical Lead attended the 11/24 NEAFC annual meeting in person, providing an <u>Opening Statement</u> in the public forum and

#### Additional Information

The following section is for any information provided by the fishery in support of this 6-month update which does not relate directly to any of the information above, but which is relevant to the ongoing monitoring of fishery management status.

The NE Atlantic Blue Whiting FIP is the foundation of NAPA's work to drive sustainability into the management of the blue whiting stock. The FIP was granted an extension in October 2024 for a further two years. Under the extension, there is no departure from the original intention to design this FIP as a "policy FIP", however there is greater focus on delivering more efficient, effective, and impactful actions building on the solid progress that NAPA has made over its initial three years, irrespective of whether that progress has been reflected at



Coastal State level. In parallel to the blue whiting FIP, in April 2024 NAPA secured a two-year extension to the mackerel and Atlanto-Scandian herring FIP.
